Mishpachah II is already under way, and on the website. This year's non-fiction Orpah's selection, Chapters of the Heart, is a moving selection of real life situations, to which we can all relate, that can lead to programs and/or social action initiatives.

As a sisterhood president you are a member of your region board. I can hear you saying, "another meeting, really?" But I want to assure that your region board and president are there to support, listen, mentor and network with you and all of your membership.

Mishpachah II

Lessons from Our Sisters

Mishpachah II offers programming on pressing concerns within families, using literature and film as triggers for discussion. Each unit is named after an archetypal woman: Sarah, Ruth, Mathilde, and Golda – all selected for their unique contributions, whether real or literary. Each unit will focus on specific challenges to contemporary family life – and families in all of their configurations – that we began to explore in Mishpachah I.

New units will be posted at www.wlcj.org every two months. Each will incorporate some aspect of the four goals: celebrating, caring, healing, learning, and will include many of the following:

- Essays from the 2014 Orpah non-fiction selection, Chapters of the Heart
- Recommendations from Wo-Flix, the Women's League film forum
- Short story selection from BookMarks (Mothers) or other short story anthologies
- Additional works of fiction and non-fiction relating to the theme
- Conversation Pieces
- Jewish text study
- Jewish values appropriate to the theme
- Newly created Jewish ritual or celebration
- Social action or chesed project

Over the course of the year, your sisterhood should offer a variety of programs. Not every program will appeal to every member, but there should be something in the course of the year to attract as many women (new and old members) as possible. In addition to the Mishpachah material, you should choose interactive programs, some type of study, social action projects, Israel advocacy/education, and a fundraiser or two if your synagogue expects financial support. Some of these can be one-time offerings, while others can be ongoing (special interest groups, for instance).

We recommend using Mishpachah as a unifying theme for the year. Here are some suggestions to use it in a variety of programmatic settings. Let us know if you have any more ideas for how to utilize this material.

- Sisterhood Goes to the Movies: Sunday morning with bagels and coffee and watch one of the films recommended in Wo-flix. Discussion questions are provided
- Special Interest Group Short Story Reading Circle: Read the stories featured in BookMarks with the discussion questions
- **Hevruta Sisters:** Use the study and learning material for those interested in ongoing text study. New material will be posted every two months
- Our Families Ourselves: An intergenerational evening using essays from *Chapters of the Heart* (Orpah's List, nonfiction 2014) as a starting point.
- **Anti-Bullying Program** for USY and middle school families, using Once Broken ... from Words that Hurt/Words that Heal
- Between the Generations: Invite USYers to visit local senior centers with your members to discuss changing family roles, residents' personal histories, create scrapbooks, etc

the Shabbat email to announcements of events and region gatherings, with the other women in your sisterhood and in your congregation who are not yet sisterhood members. You're our point person, and that can be so easy in today's electronic world: just forward the emails to your members. You never know when something might catch someone's eye and get them involved.

At Convention 2014, I spoke about connecting to the women in your synagogue. The challenge that I proposed was to identify one or two women in your synagogue who are not active. Invite them for coffee, a drink or ice cream. Connect! Find out what they like to do, what their talents are, ask them about their family...become friends. Friends like doing things with friends. Invite them to a sisterhood event with you. Just don't ask them to be on the board! Let me know if you've accepted this challenge and how it's worked for you.



PER CAPITA REMINDER

The annual per capita fee for sisterhood members was raised as for 2013. After careful consideration, we are sure that the new structure, together with our streamlined budget and the visionary strategic plan, will allow Women's League to continue to provide the outstanding educational materials, sisterhood tools and training services that have been the hallmark of its 95-year history.

We are aware of the difficulties facing sisterhoods, but we remind you that per capita has not been raised since 2003!

The next phases of the increase are:

For 2014-2015: \$13 per member

For 2015-2016 and forward: \$15 per member.

WOMEN'S LEAGUE & MASORTI ISRAEL

Part of Women's League's mission is to reinforce the bonds between our members, Conservative/ Masorti Judaism and Israel. We currently have four projects to help us achieve this goal.

REGIONS AND SPECIAL RELATIONSHIP KEHILLOT

Each of Women's League's 13 regions has developed an ongoing relationship with Masorti congregations in Israel. You can find a list of the congregations your region works with in the back of the Calendar Diary or by contacting your region leadership. We urge regions and sisterhoods to be in regular contact with the women in their partner congregations.

BAT MITZVAH PROJECT

A boy preparing for his bar mitzvah asked his mother for the name of her Torah portion. She couldn't tell him, not because she didn't know, but because she had never had a bat mitzvah with its associated parashah. For most Israeli families, a girl reaching the age of bat mitzvah is a reason for having a party. While she might have had a wonderful time with her friends and family, she would not have learned a single prayer or ritual or Torah portion.

From this simple question grew a vital new pilot program supported by Women's League and the Masorti Movement. Designed around a series of workshops, mothers and daughters prepare for this religious milestone together. For many, it will be their first exposure to accessing Jewish text and participating in synagogue ritual. Jewish tradition has long lauded a mother's ability to create a Jewish environment. Thanks to Women's League and the Masorti Movement, many more women will be able to inspire their children – both boys and girls – as full and equal participants in Jewish life.

We ask each sisterhood to donate \$100 toward this project and the Days of Study described below. Contributions from individuals will also be gratefully accepted.

WOMEN'S DAYS OF STUDY



Women's League, in conjunction with the Schechter Institute in Jerusalem, sponsors four Days of Study for women across Israel with classes taught in Hebrew, Russian, English, and Spanish. These programs have grown in popularity each year. In 2013, over 800 Israeli women studied under our auspices

In the winter there are three study days, hosted by congregations in the north, south and central parts of Israel. The classes are taught by Conservative/Masorti

rabbis and educators. In June, Machon Schechter hosts a study day for everyone. In 2013, over 300 women attended sessions taught by 18 lecturers on a wide variety of topics. BAR/BAT MITZVAH FOR CHILDREN WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

Masorti's Bar/Bat Mitzvah Program is Israeli's only nationwide effort to offer children with special needs an opportunity to celebrate becoming bar/bat mitzvah. The program provides enrichment for youth with autism, mental retardation, hearing impairments, cerebral palsy, Down syndrome, and other needs. Working with 40 schools and institutions, up to 300 children each year prepare for their aliyah latorah. Since the program's inception, more than 3,000 have celebrated this milestone in a way most never thought possible.

Women's League donates all tzedakah funds collected at tefillot at Women's League functions to this project. All tzedakah collected at tefillot during Women's League functions is donated to this project.

2014 Resolutions

Resolutions represent the official position of Women's League on a broad array of topics. This year, for the first time, in order to enable all members of Women's League to have the opportunity to vote on the proposed resolutions, the process in taking place online.

A committee met last winter and invited members to submit topics for consideration. Six were chosen and resolutions were drafted. They were posted and made available for review and members were invited to participate in conference calls to discuss them.

We are now ready to vote. A survey form will be available online by Thursday, October 29. We will notify all members who have given Women's League their email address. In addition, region presidents will include the link in their weekly messages. A link will be place on the Women's League website homepage.
