INCEPTION AND TORAH FUND

Excerpt from "How the West Was Won (Jewish That Is)", by Marjorie Pressman z"l, Beauty, Brains & Brawn, May 2004

The first wave of immigrants from Eastern Europe began in 1880. The turn of the century greeted the rise of Jewish neighborhoods and establishment of major Jewish organizations (such as) Jewish Home for the Aged, City of Hope...The Jewish Federation. Boyle Heights and West Adams emerged as centers of Jewish Life. By 1920, the Jewish population numbered 20,000, with post WWI producing another influx, swelling the numbers to 70,000.

Post WWII brought another increase, when many soldiers saw California, liked it and came to settle, swelling the ranks along with 30,000 survivors, to number 150,000.

In the 1940's synagogue life grew from five conservative synagogues, a like number of reform and a few Orthodox to a vibrant Jewish community, now with a population of 600,000, surpassed in numbers only by New York, which seemed to fulfill the 1945 prophecy of Dr. Louis Finkelstein z"I, Chancellor of the Jewish Theological Seminary, who said "in the near future there will be three main foundation stones for the Jewish people: Jerusalem, New York and Los Angeles".

The Southern California Branch of National Women's League was founded in 1947 by Augusta Kohn z"l. As a teenager, Augusta left Germany for New York, where she later met and married renowned Rabbi Jacob Kohn z"l. While in New

York, she worked with two women – Henrietta Szold z"l, of Hadassah and Mathilde Schechter z"l, both of whom were to become leaders in their own right, and pioneers in organizing the Sisterhoods of the Conservative Movements.

In 1931, the Kohns moved to Los Angeles where Rabbi Kohn became Rabbi of Sinai Temple. Mrs. Kohn and a group of Sinai women organized five Sisterhoods in the area and started the Southern California Branch. Eve Wechsberg z"l, Past Branch President, (Silver Anniversary Conference Booklet, 1972) characterized her as "our beloved founder...brought to this new Branch her love for Torah, her brilliance, and an understanding heart...shaped attitudes for future leadership and set guidelines for a significant organization".

The University of Judaism also came into existence in 1947. As the west coast branch of The Jewish Theological Seminary, it borrowed facilities from the old Sinai Temple with Rabbi Jacob Pressman z"l serving as Registrar. These spaces provided meeting rooms, offices and classes and became the 'heart and soul' of the

Conservative Movement on the west coast. With a firm partnership of faculty and supportive lay organization such as the Southern California Branch of National Women's League, this strong relationship continues to the present day.

One of the Sinai women active in Sisterhood was Marjorie Pressman z"l, wife of Rabbi Jacob Pressman z"l. She immediately volunteered to become the West Coast Torah Fund chairwomen, holding the very first Torah Fund event in 1947 with 200 women representing 11 Sisterhoods, and raising \$ 2,000.

'Preserving, promoting and perpetuating' Conservative/Masorti Judaism is the cornerstone of Women's League. To this end, the Torah Fund Campaign was established in 1942 to provide financial support for institutes of higher education by creating a scholarship fund for the students at the Jewish Theological Seminary in New York. With the establishment of the University of Judaism as a satellite, the Torah Fund Campaign also became of primary importance to the women of Southern California Branch. The funds raised supported the programs and students on both coasts, such as building both the Mathilde Schechter Residence Halls at JTS and a Residence Hall at AJU, and gave an avenue for women to be directly involved in the education of future generations of Conservative Jewish leaders, scholars and lay people. The Campaign also provided our women with leadership and educational opportunities, as well as a great deal of pride and 'nachas'. As Sonny Raffle z"I, Past Branch President, Torah Fund Lunch Program 1979, said:

"Through our Torah Fund-Residence Halls Campaign, we experience tremendous satisfaction and accomplishment for we share in the continuing growth and excellence of Judaic educational opportunities emanating from...the JTS, the UJ...and we take great pride in the knowledge that TF has made these dormitories a reality in our time."

Los Angeles is home to a multitude of Jewish cultural, artistic and educational luminaries. Our close relationship with UJ allowed us to call upon the many renowned scholars and rabbis.

The first Torah Fund event began a custom of culminating the year's campaign with a Torah Fund Luncheon honoring a prominent figure in the Jewish community. Notably, it was also a forum to express our collective gratitude of the hardworking women of our affiliates who continued to make Pacific Southwest

Branch the highest grossing fundraiser for Torah Fund. By the early 1950's, Southern California Branch became known as Pacific Southwest Branch.

In 1955, the two-day event was held at the famous Coconut Grove of the Ambassador Hotel. Over 1100 women from 28 Sisterhoods were in attendance. The honoree was Cecil B. DeMille, who had just produced the now legendary film, "The Ten Commandments". Mr. DeMille was honored for his contribution to communication through the medium of motion picture, bringing the past alive.

Women's League growth in reach, expansion in geographic region, and the advisability to highlight their international profile informed the name change.

In 1975, construction began on the new UJ campus at the site it occupies today. Mitzi Goodis, PSW President was part of the ground breaking ceremony, an honor in recognition of our women's work for the University.

On February 6th, 1979, PSW moved into their new offices in the administrative complex of UJ, the only Region to have its own dedicated space, where they have stayed until the end of 2023.

On February 21st, 1980, the Torah Fund luncheon was held at Valley Beth Shalom in Encino, where Los Angeles Mayor Tom Bradley was honored with the Women's League Humanitarian Award. Note that somewhere between 1971 and 1980, women began being referred to by their given names, recognized as individuals in their own right rather than an extension of their husbands.



By this time "our... forward-thinking women felt it was time to re- invigorate the program with enhanced content and learning. Luncheons... likely were not what younger women wanted", per Alice Greenfield, Past Branch President. As such, the first Torah Fund Study Day was held at the University in 1983. It was a huge success with 450 in attendance from approximately 49 affiliates across southern California, Nevada, Arizona and New Mexico. The day featured a keynote speaker on a topic

based on that year's Torah Fund theme with breakout workshops led by scholars and rabbis from the University.

These study days allowed our women to learn with inspiring leaders such as Dr. David Lieber, Rabbi Elliot Dorff and Dr. Rabbi Robert Wexler, to name a few. Our women personally experienced the benefits of supporting our schools of higher education as their own studies advanced. Torah Fund Study Day became a yearly event and continues to the present day.



'Prophets & Prophecies' was the topic for 1985 Torah Fund Study Day. Study and dialogue with Dr. Chanan Alexander, Dr. Elliott Dorff, Dr. Joel Rembaum, Rabbi Marshall Meyer and Rabbi Robert Wexler.

The Ziegler School of Rabbinic Studies opened in 1996 becoming the first independent rabbinical school in the Western United States. Until then, those planning to study for the rabbinate enrolled in the Graduate School of Judaica at the UJ in preparation for transfer to JTS in New York.


Rabbi Dr. Bradley Shavit Artson came to the UJ in 1999 and subsequently became the Dean of Ziegler. Rabbi Cheryl Peretz, Associate Dean, joined the staff in 2001. From that time forward, Rabbi Artson, Rabbi Peretz and PSW have forged a supportive and much valued relationship. Our Region President sits on the Boards of both UJ and Ziegler. An individual appointed by WLCJ serves as liaison between the Region and Ziegler. The Rabbis provide much valued guidance, information and support for our programs as well as education and inspiration at our events, and they rarely say no to our requests.

At our 50th Anniversary Torah Fund Special Gifts Gala in 1997, WLCJ and PSW honored Marjorie Pressman z"l for her 50 years of unceasing work for Torah Fund

and the Jewish Community. Monty Hall was the master of ceremonies for the poignant evening at a packed Temple Beth Am in Los Angeles. Edie Nitzberg, President of PSW, Evelyn Seelig, z"l President of WLCJ and Dr. Robert Wexler, President of UJ expressed their personal tribute to Marjorie.



A very special Torah Fund event was held in 2008. We honored 'twenty years of women being invested as Cantors in the Conservative Movement' by putting on a concert of women Cantors. The Torah Fund theme of *Kol Ishah*, a woman's voice, was particularly fitting. Thirteen magnificent Cantor captivated the audience of over 500.

From its inception, the enrichment and empowerment of its membership by "...providing a mutually supportive community that promotes social connection, wellness, religious commitment and spiritual wellbeing..." by Shuly Rubin Schwartz, current Chancellor of JTS, WLCJ website 2022, was the essential focus of PSW and continues to the present day. Through publications, workshops, adult education classes, programs and leadership training, sisterhood affiliates have the tools and support to thrive.


The 1953 classes offered at the UJ Included such topics as The Laws Of the Torah, Contemporary Jewish


By 1951, the first series of Leadership Training workshops was launched in the summer for the officers, chairwomen and board members of the then 20 Affiliates. Held at the UJ, these focused on organization, ways & means, membership and speaker techniques. By the late 1950's and 60's, summer orientation sessions for the incoming board along with series of workshops for Sisterhood chairwomen were well established.

As the Branch was growing, a new position was created, the Administrative Vice President, designed to assist and alleviate many of the Presidents' administrative duties. At the same time, the 'wheel of administration' was

established.





Printed pamphlets, newsletters, directories, publications from WLCJ and our self -published bulletin *Chai-Lites*, provided the primary means of communication and education between the Branch and Sisterhood Affiliates until e-mail replaced 'slow' mail.

In 1963, it was decided to group Sisterhoods by areas to foster an atmosphere of close harmony and to better address the unique challenges of each area. Branch Coordinators were appointed to act as liaisons. November 25th was

to be 'Sisterhood Area Reciprocity Day'. Instead, it was devoted to a memorial service as the country mourned the death of President Kennedy.

The Area Seminars did take place later in three widely diverse geographic locations: Van Nuys, West Los Angeles and Lakewood. This proved to be a very successful experiment and thus the decision was made that for the coming term three of the VP's would be elected specifically to act as Area Coordinators, and to hold at least one such group of area meetings a year.

"I had the unique opportunity to meet and work closely together with most of our Sisterhood presidents at our area meetings. There was dialogue and an exchange of ideas and experiences. Each Sisterhood has reaped dividends from our National mailings and our Branch directives to help project positive programs so that they will be supportive of their Synagogues and in the renewal of Jewish family life." Our Branch Board meetings were an important venue for our women as it enabled members to come together and exchange concepts and develop plans. In addition, it was an opportunity to learn about relevant current events and concerns. At the April 1961 meeting, Mrs. Yaakov Nash, wife of the Israel Consul was the guest speaker in honor of the bar mitzvah year of the State of Israel. 'The Jewish Woman, changing values, images and self-expectation' was the topic in November of 1983.

"All of our sisterhood members are invited to explore...the historical expectations of women's roles and relationships in family and society, which have combined with cultural and other opportunities to cause conflict and ambivalence for many contemporary women." In 1971, our Branch (southern California, Arizona, New Mexico, and southern Nevada) hosted the very first National Board Meeting on the west coast. Representatives from three other Branches — Northern California, (Northern California, Oregon, Washington, Utah, Northern Nevada, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming), Southwest (Oklahoma, Texas, Mexico) and Pacific Northwest (British Columbia, Alberta) also attended. This parley was a unique occasion for the women to explore strategies, to share ideas and to actively engage with women from far away.

Over the span of three days, our members enjoyed an art lecture at the UJ, a day at the Music Center where Zubin Mehta was honored for 'outstanding contribution and devotion to Judaism and the state of Israel' and an afternoon of Torah study with Rabbi Jacob Pressman on the position of the Jewish women. There was a Conference on 'recruit, activate and retain' where the newest techniques on how to attract, involve and keep members interested and active were discussed.

"This conference will focus on expanding sisterhood membership by offering in-depth religious, educational and social directives to meet the changing needs of every member: the young women, newly married, the working woman, and the golden ager," according to Mrs. Rapaport z"l, National President, B'nai B'rith Messenger, 1971

The National Board meeting was a "thrill for us to get an inside view into the workings of our National organization and to be able to actually take part in person" wrote Eve Wechsberg z"I, Presidents Report, 1972. Ten years later, in 1981, we hosted the second Women's League for Conservative Judaism Board meeting and Conference, focusing on the role of volunteers and the changing needs of the family in today's society.


The very first open board meeting outside of California was held in 1981 in Tucson, Arizona. This two-day session included nineteen Branch Board members and representatives of seventeen Sisterhoods from all four states. Workshops, group dynamics and discussions provided valuable training. More importantly, attendees learned from each other and formed friendships. Visiting our sisterhood affiliates outside of California became a yearly event and continues to the present day.

A significant policy change made at this time was the creation of a full Board of Directors, including all the chairmen with portfolios, and inviting them to alternate Executive Committee meetings. This facilitated the board to work as a unit, encouraging and developing future leadership.

During an interview in 1978, Sonny Raffle z'l, said "If I had to sum up our most important goals as an organization they would be to work closely with the Sisterhoods through programming and the providing of educational opportunities. We work to promote a sense of Jewish identity and to further the involvement of our women in the Jewish community."

These goals were achieved through myriad of events and activities during the 1980's and 1990's. The summer area workshops for Sisterhood management and leadership training provided much needed support. Our quarterly bulletin, *Chai-Lites,* promoted the relevant programs scheduled for the open branch meetings held at various synagogues. Some of these courses were Dynamics of Television News, Quests for Women's Spirituality, and Jewish Family Violence - Breaking the Silence and the Cycle.






We were pleased and honored when Women's League asked us to host the first National Leadership Institute in February of 2002. "It was a two-day intensive Jewish Leadership development program for current and future Sisterhood and Branch Board leaders led by International (?), Branch Past Presidents and Branch Trainers" as written by Carol Maller, Past President, 2017 in an article entitled, The Fruit of Our Hands. It was held on the campus of the University of Judaism, with overnight accommodations in their student dorms. As a participant, I was encouraged to discover my strengths, supported and empowered to face my

challenges, taught skills and techniques to become an effective leader and had lots and lots of fun.

There were major changes in the Conservative Jewish community in 2007. The University of Judaism and the Brandeis-Bardin Institute, two institutions that had been operating independently, joined forces. This merger led to the establishment of the American Jewish University that we know today. While it took some time for us to adjust to this new name, this union did provide us with not only a new venue but new programming ideas as well.



This Shabbaton was a very new experience for all of us. It took a great deal of work from many women, over many months, sending many emails, meeting many times and traveling to and from Brandeis-Bardin many, many times.



At International Women's League, the 28 Branches were reorganized into 13 Regions. Unlike the other Regions, the only effect on us was a change of name – Pacific Southwest Region.

The beginning of the 21st century ushered in a wave of new technology. We embraced the internet, emails and user-friendly programs and put them to use in serving our Sisterhood Affiliates. Our Region website was developed providing information on our Affiliates, Board members, upcoming events, and links to relevant organizations. A Region e-newsletter was launched, sent to our entire membership bi-monthly, offering them news and access to our conservative Jewish community. A separate, monthly e-bulletin promoting our Sisterhood Affiliates programs was sent as well. We created our iconic logo, proudly portrayed and recognized. We learned to use ZOOM for our meetings, allowing more people to participate and offer new ideas. For the first time, we elected a Region President

from outside of California for the 2015 - 2018 term. For the first time, a PSWR member, Debbi Kaner Goldich was elected as International President for the 2020 - 2023 term.

As the country became smaller through these technologies, we sought to strengthen the connection between our Affiliates, our Region, and Women's League. We hosted Leadership and Organizational Management Institutes, International Presidents joined us for Area workshops and Board meetings, and the 2012 Women's League Convention was held in Las Vegas, Nevada, the first time 'west of the Mississippi'.

During this time period, we reviewed our organization structure to be more relevant to our members and to better serve our Affiliates. We retired some portfolios, merged others, and created more Area Directors and Chair members. The Job Descriptions for both Officers and Board Members were revised, spelling out in more detail their duties and responsibilities. Finally, the By-Laws were updated to be in concert with these changes.

The 2014 By Laws revision reflected a very important change in the Conservative community – inclusion of non-Jewish partner. Membership in the Region was now open to 'any woman...' no longer 'any Jewish woman...'. It also included the necessary portfolio alterations. The 2016 revision adjusted the term of office to three years to coincide with International and changed the name 'Chair' with 'Team Leader' and 'team' members to foster cooperation and teamwork. As Brenda Katz, Region Past President reflected, "the most important wonderful thing that happened is that PSW grew stronger with teamwork and determination we overcame issues and turned them into challenges."

The most recent By Law revision in 2021 once again updated some portfolios and permitted elevating them to the position of Vice President or Secretary, when required.

On June 18th, 2017, the first Conservative ordination in Germany since the Shoah was held in Berlin by the Zacharias Frankel School, the newest Conservative Rabbinic School of the University of Potsdam under the religious supervision of the Ziegler School of Rabbinic Studies. We were so proud of our beloved Past President, Eve Wechsberg z"l, who, representing Women's League participated in the opening of the Ark. As Eve wrote later "For me, attending this event had a very special and personal meaning because my husband, Rabbi Bernard Wechsberg z"l, was one of the last graduates of the original seminary in 1936".

'The Fruit of Our Hands' was the theme for our celebration, which included five Jewish female panelists sharing personal stories of success (notice Nitzan Stein-Konin); breakout sessions with panelists; exhibits from 30 Affiliates and recognition of each; and the Women's League Open Board Meeting.




SOCIAL ACTION

"There is no greater mandate than to leave this world better than we found it. The obligation to perform gemilut hasadim (acts of loving kindness) and tikkun olam (repairing the world) are pervasive precepts in our work", WLCJ, Social Action Outreach.

Social Action has and continues to be woven into the fabric of Women's League and therefore, PSW Region. As early as 1953, workshops were held to inform and assist Sisterhood Affiliates on how to productively voice their concerns on issues effecting their communities. "Sisterhood chairwomen were invited to monthly meetings...issues of the day were discussed...digests were distributed...speakers on social action were sent out.", Outline of Year's Activities, 1953-1954.

Two of the topics discussed were 'Israel Affairs', and 'Israel and The United Nations' In the 1950's. Cooperation with other organizations such as the Community Chest and the United Jewish Welfare Fund, supporting servicemen and Veteran's Hospital services, and working for the Jewish Braille Institute were the

focus at that time.



On December 6th, 1971 after the membership Conference held at the Valley Jewish Community Center and Temple, hundreds of women marched around the Synagogue as a "sign of solidarity and concern for our brethren in the Soviet Union. December 6th had been designated as 'Women's Plea for Human Rights Day for Soviet Jewry". Eve Wechsberg, President's Report, 1972.




Educating the Jewish community about the 180,000 visually impaired Jews across the country continued to be an important public service. PSW sponsored many free workshops at the UJ to inform the public about the Large Type Print Program to enable them to read.


Our youth is our future. PSW always supported programs and organizations that engage our youth in Judaism. "The Ramah Experience" was such an event in 1983, sponsored by PSW and held at the UJ. The agenda featured films, lectures and brainstorming about the adult, family, Tikvah and summer courses offered by Camp Ramah. The "Tikvah Program...is the only West coast camping program catering to Jewish children with learning disabilities, emotional disturbances and mild mental retardation." Ramah Experience, New California, 1983. The meeting assisted the Sisterhoods in finding ways of funding the scholarships needed for children to attend the camp.

We continued to focus on social issues in our community. There were programs on 'Washington to Jerusalem – Political Hotline' and 'Jewish Family Violence – Breaking the Silence and the Cycle'. We sponsored a community workshop on Outreach to the Disabled; provided service to several state hospitals; and participated in the 1986 National March for Women's Lives held in Los Angeles. At our 1991 Conference where the theme was 'Truth, Justice and Peace', we offered a program on Jewish Law and Women's Issues and a lecture on the "Conservative Movement's response to such crucial issues as homosexuality, abortion, fetal mourning and AIDS" by Dr. Elliot Dorff.

For every Conference, Sisterhoods prepare and bring baskets of requested items to be donated to a specific local charity such as a food bank.

Our Torah Fund events also featured a social matter of concern, such as the environment. At our 2009 Torah Fund Study Day the theme was 'To Plant and Preserve'. We also hosted the annual Board Meeting of WLCJ at this event.





We support the social action platform of Women's League "as they partner with many organizations in the areas of social action and public policy. As partners, Women's League participates in advocacy that is consonant with our resolutions and mission." E-Bulletin, December 2013. Some of these include the environment, family planning, religion, women's health and gun control. We also participate in the Resolution Process which produces the formal stance of the Women's League Organization.

As tragedies occur around the country or the world, the internet permits an immediate call for assistance to be sent. Our Sisterhood Affiliates spread the news and organize the help effort, such as food or clothing collections, letter writing campaigns or knitting warm blankets.

COVID 19


March 19, 2020 CDC asks healthy people to donate blood if they are able amid a national shortage of blood during the COVID-19 pandemic.

California governor Gavin Newsom issues a statewide stay-at-home order to slow the spread of COVID-19 instructing residents to only leave their homes when necessary and shutting down all but essential businesses.

Shock, fear, confusion as the world stood still...but not for long. PSW Region, like others, quickly reached out to one another, via ZOOM, to assess what was needed to continue to serve our Sisterhood Affiliates and our community. A **lot** was needed.

We had an office we could not access. What to do with programs, workshops, and meetings and how to stay connected with our affiliates had to be addressed quickly. Suddenly, we had to become proficient in audio-visual technology, ZOOM, recording and posting on internet, scripting, and more. We had to adapt, and we had to help our Sisterhood Affiliates to do so as well. Much harder to figure out, how do we meet for lunch, coffee. How do we maintain the connections that had enriched our lives?

We found a way.



Jina Rezvanpour, Region President from 2019 – 2021 described her term as "started normal, then Covid...pandemic changed everything and all things went virtual...although did not have same intimacy, we learned to adapt and found some advantages to our new normal. I have learned the great strength of this community as we reach out to one another and connected".

Other than Board meetings, the first virtual program we held were our summer Torah Fund and Sisterhood President training workshops. The usual materials were now presented through desktop-share and emailed. Consultants carefully scripted their presentations and ZOOM etiquette was crafted. 'Web links' became the norm.

One positive outcome of the pandemic was the realization that with the technology of ZOOM, we can literally connect with anyone in the world. Adjusting for the time difference, with a few clicks, we can video-chat with Torah Office in New York or Rabbi Ederberg at Zacharias Frankel College in Potsdam. The world is our 'oyster'.



"I have difficulty finding topics for my monthly articles to write about. These last few weeks do not leave me a choice. I am so saddened with the past few weeks of Hamas's attack on Israel, I know that everyone is feeling the same pain as I am. I know people who have loved ones that were killed or taken hostage, people who

are fearful for their loved ones' lives, and people whose children and grandchildren have been called back to duty from the reserves. Our own Carol and Mel Maller and Jina and Ata Rezvanpour were in Israel during the beginning of the war. Jina and Ata have arrived back in Los Angeles safe and sound. Carol and Mel should be home next week. Even people who don't have relatives in Israel are affected by this brutality as they say: Am Echad - b'Lev Echad - One Nation, with One Heart. We are all a part of Israel.

When readers opened the Jewish Journal this week, what they saw was page after page of coverage of the massacres of October 7th, arguably the biggest Jewish story of our time. With more than 1,300 lives brutally extinguished and many thousands wounded, this was a calamity of unspeakable proportions. The images of the barbaric violence were virtually impossible to watch.

I have to say that part of me is still an emotional mess. The images of the victims haunt me. The thought of grieving families haunts me even more. I can't stop thinking of the hostages. I worry that things may get worse. The fact that I must keep up with the news nourishes that emotional mess. The emails never stop. he stories keep coming. The whiplash continues".

"On January 26th a Women's League group attended the Holocaust Remembrance ceremony at the United Nations. This is an observance that has been mandated by the United Nations since 2005.

It was when Gilad Erdan, Permanent Representative of Israel to the UN spoke, we heard the truth spoken loud and clear, and I quote, "We have been persecuted for millennia. Hitler seared the meaning of genocide into our DNA. But, on October 7th, Hamas tore open the wound," patting a yellow star, a badge the Nazi regime forced Jewish people to wear, affixed to his lapel. "On International Holocaust Remembrance Day I stand here, in the name of the State of Israel, in the name of those murdered by the Nazis and Hamas, and I swear, we will not forget. Never again is now." He received a standing ovation."





Augusta Kohn z'1 (1947-48)

Sinai Temple

She personified the Jewish mother and home maker as the wife of Rabbi Jacob Kohn of Sinai Temple. Augusta was one of the original groups in New York who aided Mrs. Solomon Schechter in founding the National Women's League and was the founder and first President of our Branch. She never sought the limelight, but her leadership and warmth enhanced any gathering. She was our Founder.

Mildred Beresow z'1 (1948-50)

A charming and personable lady, she came to our Branch from across the country, imbued with the Sisterhood spirit. She was very knowledgeable about Conservative Judaism. Our Branch Torah Fund Campaign began during her administration.





Shirley Whizin z'1 (1950-51)

Valley Jewish Community Center

Shirley was bubbly and enthusiastic. She eagerly took on the leadership of our Branch with determination, strong ideas, and the ability to carry through to her goal. She was wise enough to know that an organization benefits when a chairperson moves on and attempts a new challenge.

Saralyn Spilky z'1 (1951-53)

Valley Jewish Community Center

Saralyn was known for her beautiful smile and artistic ability. She designed and made the most incredible hats! She was very knowledgeable about Judaism and the goals of the Conservative Movement. Saralyn epitomized the qualities of leadership and was a most effective and impressive speaker.





Deon Simon z'1 (1953-54)

Valley Jewish Community Center

Deon not only had terrific organizational skills but was deeply committed to our entire Jewish community. Her strong belief in the need for Jewish education channeled her energies to the support of Camp Ramah and encouraged our women to raise funds for scholarships within their own congregations. Deon's effectiveness earned her the position of Ways and Means Chairman on the National Board.

Selma Carow Heuer z'1 (1954-56)

Sinai Temple

According to her final report, she was President of a "spirited and progressive group of women." With the guidance of her own Rebbitzen, Augusta Kohn, Selma led our Branch through two years of valuable outreach and service to all our Sisterhoods. Though diminutive in size, she was a bundle of enthusiasm and spirit, topped off by her still dynamite smile.





Shira (Shirley Finn) Deutsch z'l (1956-58) Valley Jewish Community Center Shirley, as she was known in those days, was well-trained in the ways of our Branch and our devotion to Torah fund as she had chaired two of our most spectacular Torah fund events. Under her leadership our Branch reached out with mobile workshops and numerous opportunities for personal involvement and growth.

Marjorie Pressman z'l (1958-59)

Temple Beth Am

Marjorie was known for her willingness to undertake any task someone else would find impossible. Her term in office was marked by innovations such as creating the position of Administrative Vice President, the mimeoed Branch Calendar/Directory and the UJ snack bar. She was the recipient of the Seminary's National Community Leadership Benefactor Award in 1964. She was on the National Torah fund Cabinet and a National Board Member.





Bess Freeman z'1 (1959-60) Valley Jewish Community Center

During Bess' year in office, the Branch adopted the organizational structure known as the "Wheel of Administration" to improve the functioning of Branch. The position of Executive Secretary held by our beloved Sylvia Newman z'l became a permanent 4 day-a-week position. Bess was always a staunch supporter of programs for our young people, USY and Torah Fund. She still worked for Torah Fund at her home congregation, Beth Shalom in Las Vegas, and this remarkable lady never missed a Spring Conference held by our Branch.

Sarah Harwick-Feder z'l (1960-62)

Hollywood Temple Beth El

Sarah's theme for her Presidential report was "draw from the past, live in the present and work for the future." That has always been her personal motto. She fine-tuned the administration of our Branch, encouraged community participation, and laid the groundwork for dealing efficiently with the needs of our Sisterhoods and their leadership for our growing Branch which numbered 50 Sisterhoods in 1962. Sarah's excellent talent for speaking and analysis has made her our ear on World Affairs and Social Action for many, many years.



Marian Wall z'1 (1962-64)

Valley Jewish Community Center

Marian was President during very significant times in the history of our movement and country. During her term the Seminary launched the Torah Fund Combined Campaign to raise funds for the Mathilde Schechter Residence Hall. She introduced the concept of Area Vice Presidents who served as Branch liaison to specific sisterhoods and the Branch Board held a weekend retreat at Camp Ramah with study sessions by our rabbinic scholars and leadership training by our own Women's League authorities. Marion served for many years as part of the OUTLOOK Editorial Board, and you will find many of her articles in our Anniversary display.

Tillie Mandell z'1 (1964-66)

Adat Shalom

Tillie was known for her careful planning and precise coordination as well as her stylish millinery attire. Outreach to the broader Jewish community was increased by programs such as Ongay Shabbat at Fairview, Camarillo, and Pacific State Hospitals. In addition, the first Girl Scout Menorah Awards were presented to our region. Under the auspices of the Los Angeles office of Urban Affairs, Women's League volunteers began working with disadvantaged children.





Frances Kuris z'1 (1966-68)

Temple Beth Am

Frances had the special opportunity of serving as President when Women's League observed its Golden Jubilee, 50th Anniversary. The first city-wide Advanced Gifts event for the Torah Fund Campaign was sponsored by the Branch. Frances served is a National Board Member, a member of the National Torah fund Cabinet and the National Women's Patrons Society. She was also the recipient of the Seminary's Solomon Schechter Award.

Bea Reynolds z'1 (1968-70)

Adat Ari El

Bea, with her quiet, dignified manner, kept our sights on our Jewish heritage and our obligation to educate ourselves and our women. She provided us with increased opportunities for developing leadership skills and supporting Torah Fund. Bea, like many of her predecessors ably represented us on the steering committees of Welfare fund, Israel Bonds, United Way and was our



first representative to the newly formed Women's Conference of the JFC. Bea has long been a member of the Board of the University of Judaism and as you see in our program has been deservedly recognized by our National Organization. She was the recipient of the National Community Leadership Award and the Solomon Schecter Award presented by the Seminary. She served on The National Board, National Torah Fund Cabinet, National Women's Patron's Society, and the Outlook Editorial Committee.



Eve Wechsberg z'1 (1970-72)

Ner Tamid of South Bay

The two highlights during Eves' administration were the celebration of twentyfive years of the PSW Branch, present was the LA Consul General of Israel. The second was we held a special Torah Fund Benefactor Day at the Music Center where we honored Zubin and Nancy Mehta.
