RELIGIOUS OBSERVANCE

The Committee aims to help further traditional Judaism.

It lays special stress on the observance of the Sabbath and holidays.

By regular attendance at Synagogue.

By refraining from shopping.

By organizing an Oneg Shabbat

It stresses observance of dietary laws.

Sisterhoods are asked to cooperate in furthering these efforts.

Use your influence with Jewish organizations to observe dietary laws at all public functions.

Help insure the establishment of Kosher Kitchens in all Jewish institutions.

Assist in the efforts to open kosher cafeterias to college students.

Each Sisterhood appoint a Chairman to cooperate with the National in its endeavors.

STUDENT ACTIVITIES

The Women's League aims to influence the Jewish youth at college by

- (a) Cooperating with existing Jewish Institutions on the campus.
- (b) Introducing kosher kitchens for the Jewish students wherever possible.
- (c) Urging the extending of home hospitality to out of town students during the Festivals, especially on Passover.
